## Art for Sea exhibit time extended to Nov. 30

Exhibit also held at **Brielle Public Library**


**BELMAR** — The show will go on for the Art for Sea Exhibit at the Belmar Art Center.

The exhibit, which raises funds to support environmental groups, will continue into the end of November at the gallery on River Road. The exhibit is part of a series of art-based fundraisers they have held throughout the area which have raised thousands of dollars.

"Art is powerful in terms of not only sometimes telling a story, but also I think everyone likes to look at nice art," Suzanne Crosby, president of Art for Sea, said. "We're trying to tug on people's heart strings by letting them know why we are doing this, and if they buy a piece of art from us they are supporting these ocean conservation groups."

Of the nine art fairs and two art exhibits held by Art for Sea, \$4,000 have been raised. Roughly \$2,000 has been given a seagull created from used to environmental groups.
